Gaining Momentum



See Stories gained 501(c) 3 status in 2019, just before the pandemic. Like many other organizations and non-profits, we had to adapt to meet the needs of our communities throughout Alaska and to keep our mission alive and thriving. When the shut-down first occurred in Alaska, all of our workshops were canceled, leaving us adrift and wondering what the future looked like. We adapted and grew because of our virtual workshops, being able to serve students and teachers we may not otherwise had been able to serve, along with bringing in collaborators and instructors, many from out of state! Now as we move forward, the work has not slowed down and has been gaining momentum as we have been able to offer classes in person for the first time in over 2 years, while our online presence and digital workshops continue to grow!

Youth Film Workshop in Juneau, AK on Tlingit Land

For one of the first times since the pandemic, See Stories director, Marie Acemah, was able to travel to Juneau to lead an in-person Youth Film Workshop at the Alaska State Library, Archives, and Museum. The students produced mini-documentaries on topics related to fishing and canneries inspired by the Mug-Up exhibit. Students produced stories from haunted ships to sport fishing to crabbing to salmon can labels, all within a matter of days in a class that usually takes 2 weeks! The students screened their films at the Alaska State Museum and a story was featured on KTOO Public Media.

Podcast feature: Alaska Teen Query by KBFPC REC Room

Collaborator and See Stories Diversity and Inclusion Educator, Rafael Bitanga facilitated a podcasting workshop for The Kachemak Bay Family Planning Clinic REC Room Peer Education team in Homer, AK. A team of peer educators, ages 15-18, developed a podcast based on a chosen sexual health-related topic, conducting interviews with community members while weaving their personal stories and perspectives. Kaitlin Armstrong, See Stories Collaborator & Instructor, **Podcasting Production at West High**

See Stories collaborates with local artists, documentarians, and storytellers to fund professional film and podcast productions. Currently, See Stories is partnering with collaborator and sound artist, Kaitlin Armstrong, who recently taught a podcasting production workshop this spring. Students from West High School explored how their identities and Alaska's history intersects and learned the basic flow of podcasting production and interviewing. Students interviewed cultural leaders, such as Alice Qannik Glenn of Coffee & Quag and had the chance to record their podcasts at Alaska Public Media. See Stories publicized these podcast episodes the summer of 2022, while supporting Kaitlin Armstrong in her next project, a documentary podcast that explores how settler colonial myths shape popular conceptions of Alaska' history and reframes those myths. See Stories sponsored Kaitlin on a trip to Kodiak (Sugpiaq land) to do some reporting for the documentary.

Through the podcast, Kaitlin will explore the myths that shape how Alaskans view our histories and ourselves by taking a critical look at dominant narratives that run through Alaska's history. Each episode will revisit a different era of Alaska's history and look at how that period has been remembered and misremembered.
